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A. COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

The course objective is for students to acquire, in a clear and simple way, references to the distinct aspects of Spanish culture, history and civilization in order to enrich in this way their knowledge of the language.

This course provides knowledge about diverse aspects of Spanish society, the traditional aspects as well as the more current aspects. The intention of the course is that the students can understand, have an interest and do research about the sociocultural reality of a country, where they are going to live and coexist with its inhabitants.

Daily class attendance, selected reading, notes, articles given out by the teacher and the students day to day experiences in Spain will all contribute to the overall objective of the course.

Students will have to carry out different tasks or work assigned by the teacher on specific dates throughout the semester; the grading of these will count towards the final grade for the course.

Some of the topics taught in class may vary depending on the current Spanish situation at the time that the topics are being taught in class.

C. ATTENDANCE AND EXAMS

- Class attendance is mandatory given that the student is expected to participate actively in class expressing opinions, experiences and doubts. The number of absences will affect the final grade. If any student has more than 3 unjustified absences, their final grade will be reduced by 10%.
- As for punctuality, five minutes after class has started students can not interrupt by entering, and this will count as an absence.
- It is not possible to change the date of any exam except for with medical justification; therefore no other excuses will be valid such as travel excuses.



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- There will be three exams throughout the course which will not be accumulative. Each exam will be made up of a series of questions to be answered in brief and that will cover all the information presented and discussed in class since the previous exam.
- Each exam will count for 25% of the final grade.
- The students should participate actively in class contributing ideas, evaluations and criticism about the explored topics and the obligatory reading in class.
- Students will have to write a final paper and do a corresponding oral presentation in class about a topic related to an aspect of Spain which will be able to be freely chosen by the student. Alternatively the paper and presentation can be based on some of the topics of those proposed by the teacher in class.

D. FINAL PAPER

Final paper/ presentation ____15%

The final paper must be printed out as a Word document, 1.5 spaced and Arial font size 12. The document should be 4 or 5 pages long with an extra page where students will reference the bibliography used in the development of the piece of work.

For the oral presentation anything can be used to make the presentation interesting and clear for the students. The students can ask questions, make comments and



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express opinions related to the topic that the student is trying to talk about in the presentation.
