



Spanish Civilization.

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1. COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES.

This course is aimed at studying characteristic features of Spanish life, culture and personality. Historical and cultural references will be treated to make students understand better the Spanish culture and civilization. Understanding a culture, especially when it is as complex as Spain's, requires an insight into the historical circumstances that have shaped it. This course targets a number of historical, traditional and social aspects that always point towards the present and to the most significant and emblematic features of Spain's current reality.

Class attendance together with assigned readings; handouts and notes taken in class will help students to get the aims of this course. Students are expected to participate expressing their opinions based on their daily experience in Spain.

2. NORMS IN CLASS

Attendance is mandatory and it will be taken at each class meeting. If a student has more than 3 unjustified absences at the end of the course his/her final grading will be affected as follow: 4 absences will be penalized 4 %; 5 will be 6% off, 6 will be penalized 8% as the 7th, 10% will be taken off the final grading.

As far as punctuality is concerned no students will be allowed in class five minutes later than class time.

Exams must be done on the day fixed beforehand. If an exam or any assignment is missed and requires make up, the professor needs a justification of the absence. No travel justifications or excuses will be accepted.

In class is not allowed eating or drinking.

Plagiarism or cheating is sanctioned with a grade of F (zero) for the work involved.

If a student cheats in an exam, automatically will have F (zero) in the class.

3. EVALUATION CRITERIA.

In order to obtain their grade, the students will have to read required readings and participate in class with discussions of the specific topic for that class. There will be three written exams in which students will be assessed on the topics covered in





each different parts of the course. The three exams will be made up of short answers and short essays.

There will also be a final paper in which the students will work on a topic related to Spain.

Material preparation, completed reading before class, and discussions are all our participation. Attendance and punctuality are expected and laxity in these areas will have a negative effect.

The students will work a cultural aspect of Spanish life or tradition, policy or any current event that they are interested about; otherwise the teacher will give a list of proposed topics to work about.

The students will present a written report, which follow the format of an academic paper. This project will then be presented orally to the rest of the class.

Any material from the Internet, interview, people, newspapers... can be included, but the students need to make reference to the material used at the end of the project. It is necessary for the student to show and express his/her opinion about the topic. You can ask the professor for help or orientation on your report at any time.

The content of each oral presentation will be included in the final exam.

General Rules for Paper:

The required papers must be printed out. No handwritten paper will be admitted.





They MUST BE HANDED IN ON TIME. No unjustified delayed paper will be corrected or evaluated.

Format: Word Document / Paper Size: A4 / Font: Arial 12 / 1.5 interline space. 6 or 7 pages plus an extra one to mention the sources.

Number each page on the right down corner in your written report and place your name, class code and date (day, month, year) on the right up corner.
